As I write this, the Community Produce Program truck is rolling up its doors to reveal bins full of fresh broccoli, apples, sweet potatoes and cauliflower available for free to those who may not be able to afford it on their own. Thanks to your donations, the assortment of produce will be different next week, and the week after, providing varied nutrition and freedom of choice.

With the support of our community, we have access to produce at 5 to 15 cents per pound through the California Association of Food Banks, which allows us year-round access to millions of pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables.
